A Christmas message from Rev^{4} Rachel.

November 2023

Dear Friends,

By the time you read this, you may already be all Christmassed out. From early November, Christmas music is all around us, Christmas planning is well underway, and Christmas adverts are everywhere.

This year, the Christmas advert from M&S has caused a bit of a stir. After various celebrities dismantle some popular Christmas traditions – writing cards, 'Elf on the Shelf' and family board games – the advert ends with the line, 'this Christmas, do only what you love'. Similarly, John Lewis have also made their tag line 'let your traditions grow'. Both retailers are encouraging people to reconsider their Christmas traditions – and, of course, to use their shops for your Christmas shopping!

I wonder if you have Christmas traditions that are important to you. Everyone has traditions, rhythms and routines, it's part of being human. And as the nights draw longer and we are surrounded by more darkness, it's good to have traditions that remind us that darkness does not have the final word; to gather with people and to celebrate light, love and joy.

One of my traditions is to go to church at Christmas – and well, of course, the rest of the year too.

At the Midnight Mass service, we hear a reading from John's gospel that is always read at Christmas: 'The Light shines in the darkness, and the darkness did not overcome it.'

It's a reading that reminds us why we celebrate Christmas. Because Christmas is a revelation where something very old, something in fact that is eternal, becomes new. God born as a baby. Christ comes into the darkness of the world, to enlighten us, so that we might know that each one of us is born to be part of a wider family, something much bigger than ourselves. And we are invited to receive him, and become new ourselves. As O Little Town of Bethlehem goes, '**be born in us today'.**

It's good news, it's old news, but it's also new news, because for each one of us, we are offered a fresh start.

All traditions were new once. All new things can become traditions. Perhaps, this year you might want to make an old tradition your new tradition and come along to a church service. There are plenty to choose from and you are so welcome. Come and see.

May Christ's love and light illuminate and bless you and your household this Christmas. With love

Remembrance Day at All Saints Church

It was wonderful to see the church packed with both adults and young people at our Remembrance Day Service. Reverend Rachel led the service, ably assisted by a group of uniformed young people. Beryl Whiteside took us into the history of a young man from Rayne, Private Thomas Hammond who, together with two friends, enlisted and were killed in action on the same day in the First World War.

After this, we were all given a link to a paper chain on which we wrote a prayer and the links were joined together to form a chain of hope. This has been hung in the church.

To conclude, our local choir, the La-La's, sung a very beautiful and moving rendition of Bridge over Troubled Water.

Just before eleven o'clock we made our way to the War Memorial where Colin Miles read out the names of the fallen who were killed in action in both world wars. Claire Scales played the First Post and we all observed a minute's silence.

To finish, we were all treated to a very welcome tea or coffee and a warm up in the Old School Room!!



Wildlife Reports, till November 7th 2023

Andy Goodey The Street 14/10 heard a Cetti's warbler singing from the pondside vegetation at Rayne churchyard. At the same time a Red Kite was flying overhead. Andy made the comment that when he moved to Rayne in 1998 they are two species that one would never have expected to see. Unless you are an experienced birder like Andy the Cetti's is not a bird that many would recognise.

Phil Monk Smithsfield 16/10 watched a herd of 19 Fallow deer resting under the trees by the Rayne quarry. A male had a splendid set of antlers. During October and November, the bucks create rutting areas called leks to which the females are attracted to mate. These areas are often used every year. The level of pregnancy in the does is very high, often over 90%. Some doe fawns may also become pregnant. In an area with good cover and food supply, numbers of deer can very rapidly expand. The does can have fawns for about 10 years. Phil has regular visits from a fox at night and his feeders attract a mixed



flock of birds including Blue, Great and Long Tailed tits and Black Caps while a Sparrow hawk makes weekly visits. On 5/11 Phil saw a Grey Wagtail at the sewerage works and the Little Owl sat in his usual spot enjoying the sun. It was probably making sure that no other owl will take over its annual nesting site.

Helen Coney Shalford Road 7/11 noticed a night visitor to their garden, a *Hedgehog*. Helen is putting out food and water for it and is about to put in a hog house. Helen's picture shows a contented hog. The Hummingbird Hawk moth that Helen reported last month was still visiting her Salvias in October.

At Goulds last month I report-

ed a Badger who had dug out a wasp's nest in the garden. Badgers always use a latrine for their toilet droppings. Normally the Badger latrines have only one set of droppings in a shallow scrape, sometimes a few more. This resourceful Badger has at least 14 and perhaps many more droppings in the hole it dug to extract the wasp's nest. It also indicates that our garden is on a major badger highway, the picture only shows the surface droppings not the deeper infill. Latrines are common near badger setts and on their main highways. It is said that the position of latrines are used to mark the territorial boundaries of the sett. I am not convinced as I have found latrines when walking down tramlines in the middle of a 100 acre field, perhaps they were caught short. The droppings are often very wet especially when eating their main delicacy, earthworms. They often contain bones, feathers, fur and other unidentifiable bits that suggest they often scavenge for food especially if their sett is near human habitation.



A neighbour at Duckend has a small pear tree that had an excellent crop hanging on the tree. There was a ditch with four Badger latrines in the bottom that gave the Badgers a highway to the tree. The Badger was not used to such a large supply of fruit as its droppings were very 'loose'. When it first started eating the pears, they were hard, but it ate all those it could reach. Then it had to wait until the rest dropped off in an over ripe condition. The latrines reflected this as the droppings became very moist.

I know it's not Rayne, but I found it amusing. A friend I know well lives in Braintree in a row of terraced houses. Like many of the houses of that age the ground floors consisted of timber floorboards on timber joists supported well above the original soil surface. Like many terraces this void is continuous between all the houses in the terrace. My friend has been a keen shooting person most of his life and lives with his wife. I will not mention his name which will become clear why when I finish the rest of this tale. In their front living room, they have small low coffee table which had a bowl of pears on it. One morning a pear was found near the skirting board and had been partly eaten. By the pear was a chewed hole in the timber floor boards which was not big enough for the pear thief to get the pear through. My friend decided the miscreant was a rat, this was partly confirmed when talking to his neighbour who confirmed he had seen rats foraging in his garden.

My friend did not want to use poison which could have resulted in several smelly bodies under his floor so he decided that he would sit in a chair with his four-ten shotgun in the evening and wait for the suspected rat to return. At this stage he had not told his wife or neighbours of the proposed execution that could happen in the middle of the night. He has now decided to change the plan and a pest control company is putting down poison. A pity as I was hoping to have a picture of a dead rat laying beside a second hole in the floorboards caused by the shotgun. The neighbour has now found that a metal air vent to the void below his ground floor had rotted and this was probably the route being used by the rat to gain access.

Rats, mice and voles have had a very successful breeding season in the countryside this year but in the autumn, they need to find shelter for the coming winter, preferably with a food supply. The obvious places are to be found where us humans live and work and feed birds, pets and other wildlife. At Goulds if a tenant claims to have seen signs of a rodent I will always ask if they keep any food in their unit. Mice are very appreciative of chocolate biscuits as one tenant found when his biscuits had pieces missing. Surprisingly he was still eating from the packet.

The local Muntjac also feasted on fallen fruit in our orchard. (Photo shown in last month's report) The Kestrel regularly occupies its nest box to ensure no interloper takes it over and the Blue Tit with the nest box camera occupies the box every night for the same reason.


