Dear Friends,

As I am writing this, I am looking at the tree in the front garden which is full of blossom. It is quite simply lovely. I wonder why I've not really paid much attention to it before – because of course there is blossom every year. I think it's been noticeable this year because I've been looking at it through the eyes of my children. They want to touch and smell the blossom and my daughter has delighted in spotting the bees zooming in and out of the flowers. It's a feast for the senses.

I have done nothing to the tree apart from occasionally drive into its branches. And yet it has brought so much joy and wonder into our little family's life. But of course it has a larger part to play – the bees, the nectar, the pollination, all of these things are essential for us to have and eat the fruits we love. It's a wonder that I don't stop to marvel more.

I'm reminded of Elizabeth Barrett Browning's poem:

Earth's crammed with heaven,

And every common bush afire with God,

But only he who sees takes off his shoes;

The rest sit round and pluck blackberries.

There are so many opportunities we are given each day to wonder, to draw us more deeply into beauty, which can make us consider questions like 'why does beauty exist?' 'Is this all due to chance?' 'Could there possibly be a Creator?' And if we start to wonder about these big questions then that changes the way that we see things and see ourselves – as part of something so much bigger, a creation 'afire with God.'

But it is easy to get distracted. In a conversation with a friend recently, we were talking about our addictions to our smart phones. Though we are of very different generations – her retired with grandchildren and me in my thirties – we both talked about the dopamine rush we get from social media. It is easy and exciting to get sucked into scrolling, seeing new information, new ideas, new...new...new but she commented how we have lost the art of gazing.

In the gospel of Matthew, Jesus talks about worry, and he looks to nature to give people a little perspective. He says:

"If God gives such attention to the appearance of wildflowers—most of which are never even seen—don't you think he'll attend to you, take pride in you, do his best for you? What I'm trying to do here is to get you to relax, to not be so preoccupied with *getting*, so you can respond to God's *giving*. (The Message paraphrase, Matthew 6.30-33) This month, as the grass grows and the flowers bloom and we hope the weather gets warmer, may we gaze a little more and wonder a bit more deeply. And I will look at the blossom tree just a little longer.

District Councillor Ann Hooks

Dear all, I hope my monthly report finds you all well.

It was fantastic to see and chat to so many residents at the recent coffee morning, on a vast range of topics across the village. The morning was jointly hosted by the Parish Council and Team JAWS, fundraising on behalf of Young Lives vs Cancer. An amazing amount of money was raised. A huge well done to all involved.



I also popped into Braintree Library to see the exhibition by the Rayne Artists. Well done, for those that organised the exhibition and to all the artists that exhibited their work. I hope that you will be able to do another one soon!

The Essex County Council consultation on its Mineral Plan, has now ended, after being given a time extension. Thank you to all that took the time to help fight the two proposed extensions to the current quarry. We now have to wait for ECC to process the answers and see what sites will be put forward as their preferred sites. This will be likely to be at the end of this year or the beginning of next year.

Applications to the Councillor grant scheme are now open again. Please get in contact if you wish to apply for a small grant that will help within the community. The last year saw me use all of my allocation across three projects. I helped fund new carpet at Rayne Village Hall entrances, insulation at the Old School Room and a new noticeboard at Rayne school for the PSA.

During the past month I helped deliver and supported the 'Debate not Hate' motion at Braintree District Council. The unanimous support of all Council members during the debate, means that BDC will be signing up to the Debate not Hate campaign. It is sad that we have to do these kinds of campaigns, but in a recent poll seven out of ten councillors have suffered from abuse, intimidation and ridicule, in all sides of their role. It was important that this motion was highlighted and supported, I am proud to have been a big part of Braintree District Council signing up and adhering to the campaign.

I have also attended member training on waste management and recycling in the District. This was an enlightening and valuable evening. The Council is always looking at ways of improving its recycling rate and we discussed ways in which we can improve services and how recycling can be made easier for residents.

There was also a briefing on how the bins are collected. Routes are planned by adjacent areas day to day. So, if a bin is missed, it is not far out of the way to go back and collect it. Lorries have equipment onboard that allows them to mark when a road is completed, meaning back at base, they can direct quickly to a missed bin that is reported. Any missed bin collections must be reported to the Council by 12:30 the day after your normal collection day.

The Year 3 and Year 4 children at **Rayne Primary and Nursery** have been

out and about in the community the last half term. In history, Year 3 have been conducting traffic surveys which has been a brilliant way to think like geographers and apply their maths skills. They surveyed the traffic on Stane Street (now The Street) which they had discovered was one of the roads originally built by the Romans as a direct route from St Albans to Colchester. Within a 15 minute period, they discov-



ered that just like in Roman times, it continues to be a busy main road to-day. We weren't lucky enough to see any motorcycles but we saw a bicycle and a bus. The fact that the bus came past, reinforced our conclusions about Stane Street being a main road. We have also started to think about the environmental impact of the traffic on Stane Street as part of our Changemaker's curriculum, realising that living on a main road is noisy and polluting. During our survey we didn't see a single electric car and most vehicles, including the bus, only carried one passenger.

Year 4 took a trip to the church as part of their RE curriculum. They have been focusing on: How do religious groups contribute to society and culture in the local area and beyond? They visited Reverend Roman and Kate to discuss all the different activities they host and provide for the community. We learnt that the church help many areas of society including: children, adults and the elderly! We also found out that they provide Picnic in the Park and have also made woolly hats for the homeless in the winter. We enjoyed visiting the church and

learning about all the different contributions they make to our local community. A massive thank you to Rev Roman and Kate for providing a fantastic talk as well!





The Rayne Cricket Club is actively looking to recruit new members to play in their two senior sides. The club has been in existence for over 100 years and has continued to field two sides over the weekend in the face of growing pressure on village cricket teams. Shalford, Cressing, Bocking, and Felsted are a few neighbouring villages that once boasted strong clubs but sadly are no longer in existence. HOW TO PROTECT AND MARK YOUR PROPERTY

I talk to many of you in the rural communities whether at farmer's markets, coffee mornings or generally patrolling about the importance of marking property as every year Essex Police recover hundreds of items and we are unable to return to their rightful owners -why is this? Because the property is not marked.

There are various ways in which you can mark your property, the simplest method being to mark or etch your property with your postcode, house or flat number or the first three letters of your address. All of these measures help police identify stolen goods, making it harder for thieves to sell. *So make your mark*!

As technology improves there are now advanced products on the market:

Essex Police do not promote any one company, just those that are secured by design.

What is Property Marking?

The Secured by Design ("SBD") membership scheme includes member companies whose products have been awarded the 'Police Preferred Specification' status. As a police initiative Secured by Design was implemented to encourage the building industry to adopt crime prevention measures in the design of developments to assist in reducing the opportunity for crime and the fear of crime, creating a safer and more secure environment and ensuring that the product is sufficiently robust to resist physical attack by casual and opportunistic criminals. The SBD focus is on the critical factors that combine to deliver a product's performance - design, use, quality control and the ability to deter or prevent crime. Examples are:

Smart Water, Selecta DNA, Asset Marking.

What is DNA Property Marking?

DNA property marking is a forensic marking system designed to reduce theft by coding valuable possessions with unique synthetic DNA and using warning labels to alert criminals your property is protected. Each property marker contains thousands of microdots which allow Police to identify property located at the scene in a matter of seconds. Thieves can no longer get away with possessing stolen property when confronted by Police. This small bottle of glue which is easily applied to lots of household items contains UV tracers which are incorporated in the synthetic DNA product making it easy for Police to locate and return to their owners.

Other DNA products include Personal Defence Sprays, Underground DNA spray for cables, Tool marking kits, DNA intruder sprays and Tagging Sprays.

Wildlife Reports, till April 7th 2024

Neville Walker Brunwin Road 13/3 was putting out apples for the Blackbirds when he spotted a Hummingbird Hawkmoth hovering over the flowers on the Crocuses and Hyacinths. Neville commented that it is very early in the year to see them, and most books report they are not usually active until early summer. They are one of my favourite insects as they hover and uncurl their long proboscis to reach down to the bottom of long flowers to reach nectar at the base of the flowers. Their wings do make a humming sound. It is usually only a summer visitor migrating to the UK from Southern Europe in variable numbers each year, feeding on flowers such as Red Valerian, Honeysuckle, and Buddleia. There have been reports that this day flying moth is overwintering in increasing numbers. Neville's moth is probably regretting its decision to overwinter this year but they are reported as flying in light rain.

Roger Martin Duckend Green 21/3 reported hearing a Chiffchaff in his garden and earlier in the week at Felsted and at Braintree station. This is also mainly a summer visitor, spending the winter in the Mediterranean area and south of the Sahara. I cannot comment on its call as I depend on lip reading as many of you have discovered. Roger finished his email with the comment "Spring is here-what a relief!" Since then its blown storm force winds and rained virtually every day, I'm glad Roger is not forecasting the weather.

Beryl Whiteside 25/3 sent an email commenting on the abundance of Snakes Head Fritillary and the **yellow Marsh Marigold** near the ponds at the Oak Meadow Nature Reserve. Beryl sent pictures of both growing at the reserve. The Marsh Marigold was a resident when the Parish Council purchased the Nature Reserve area, but the Fritillary came from seeds from plants in our garden. Our plants originated from seed from a Suffolk Nature Reserve and from a friend of Sylvia's who had them growing on her land in Ireland. The Suffolk source was a very wet meadow which was heavily poached by cattle so competition from other plants was minimal. I apologise to Beryl as the picture shows her picture of the Marsh Marigold at the Nature Reserve but the Fritillary pictures



are from Goulds which covers an area of about 5m x 20m in size and must be about 5-6 years old. I have been waiting to write about creating flower rich sites on village roadside verges or land owned by the Parish. The secret is not to cut off the plants until the seed has completely ripened. All the Fritillary at Goulds have spread by seed, admittable with help by human hands. But this technique can be applied to many other wild plant varieties. One does have to tolerate unkempt areas while the preferred plant is colonising it. The Fritillary species we have in Rayne is Fritillaria meleagris and is uncommon in the UK. It is considered by many botanists as native to the UK, other botanists disagree. There is

no disagreement that it is a very attractive plant and if anyone wishes to add it to their patch, I am willing to give them some seed. It is stated that it requires damp conditions but at Gould's the area is usually dry under trees. Roger and Sue Pertwee at Rayne Hall have it growing near one of their ponds.

Phil Monk 4/4 saw his first Swallow of the year flying around the sewerage works and two Red Kites and numerous Sky Larks over the nearby airfield.

Tim Wignall Pound Farm Cottage had 6 Siskins in his garden, on 26/3 this had then increased to 14. He also recorded 2 or 3 Red Kites flying near his cottage. A Wren has also visited the garden which probably indicates a nesting site nearby. The picture is of a male Siskin on one of his feeders.

Chris Turner Medley Road 4/4 was having dinner and like all good wildlife reporters was looking out of the window. A Hummingbird Hawkmoth was feeding on the primroses in the garden. Chris also commented that he



thought it was the earliest he had ever seen one. I hope it was a different one from the one that Neville recorded earlier in this report.

At Goulds we have regular visits from a Red Kite. One morning I was able to watch it sitting in a tree about 30m distance while shaving in the bathroom. Since then both Sylvia and I have had numerous sightings as it has flown below tree height through the



garden. We quickly realised that these visits were to check up on a *Jackdaw* which had a damaged wing and could not fly. Every time the kite appeared the Jackdaw quickly disappeared under the nearest bush. We have an open fronted bird nest box which is the most stupid item to have for nesting birds as it provides an easy meal for Grey Squirrels when the nestlings become large enough.

The squirrel always waits until its intended meal grows to an edible size. I should add that my nest box is now inside a cage of 70mm mesh which keeps out most larger predators. Since installing the cage we have had different species using it. This year it is a Wren which has filled the nesting area of the box with one large nest with a single small

hole to enter the nest in the top, centre. All our Tit boxes have 32mm entry holes which allow Great Tits to use them, All these boxes have a metal plate with a 32mm hole which prevents Grey Squirrels from opening up the entrance hole of my timber boxes to take the young. Concrete based boxes do offer some protection, but we have bat boxes made of this material that have had their entrances enlarged. The bats roost in the top of the box so they probably escape being eaten.

Unfortunately, we have been very successful with rearing wild Mallard ducks. In the last two years we have had duck counts of over 50 including progeny. This has destroyed the wildlife habitat of our main garden pond which was the former farm water supply before mains water, and the lagoon which now takes all the storm water from the farm buildings. What goes into the beak of a duck comes out of the other end into the water. The two water bodies used to be clear and had a range of damselflies and dragonflies. This year we have two pairs of mallard, one on each water body, there are also up to three to five drakes that stick together. These have a female that will be nesting in nearby gardens that have a small pond or ditch containing water. The female always has a nest site that has nearby water for the ducklings when they hatch. Once the eggs hatch food supply for the ducklings becomes important. It is important that any neighbours near Goulds get a supply of food suitable for ducklings in stock, adult duck food is inadequate. I use sunflower hearts which is suitable for adults and ducklings. This should be fed as soon as ducklings are seen or immediately you find a duck wandering round the garden. This will hopefully discourage the female from returning to Goulds with its ducklings to get fed by me. Rearing ducks is more satisfying than having a dog or pet as eventually the ducks will fly away.
