

A message from Rev Rachel.

June 2024

Dear Fríends,

'You're joking! Not another one!' So said Brenda from Bristol back in 2017 at the news of another General Election. The video of her reaction to this news went viral, as it seemed to sum up the national spirit. In 2019, there was of course another one, and this month on the 4th July we will yet again go to the polls.

Whatever side of the political spectrum we find ourselves, we could probably all agree that the last few years have been very turbulent. For some, like Brenda, this may spark apathy; for others this may come with resolve that new leadership will usher in new hope. Whichever party wins the election, there is no Messiah nor magic solution to the problems in this country. And yet the prospect of disappointment though should not stop us from getting involved and having our say. Each one of us matters and so does our voice. Some say that religion and politics should never mix. But Jesus certainly did not say that! Christianity and politics are both, at their best, about helping people to flourish. Many Christians feel that part of their faith is a duty to serve others, and are so drawn into public service, motivating to care for the most vulnerable, as Jesus did. Even if people do not have faith, there is a shared language between faith and politics, with the understanding of duty as 'service' and those who govern as 'ministers'. For both the church and the Houses of Parliament, true service is about using what power we have to help others, rather than boosting our own status and fortune.

For those who are Christians, faith is not a 'Sunday' activity. Time and time again in the Bible, God rejects 'religion' that is lip service – instead faith is to be shown in our actions and our commitment to '*act justly, love mercy and walk humbly*' with God every day (Micah 6.8). As such, it matters how we engage as citizens: engaging with our parish and district councils; signing petitons when required and using our opportunity to vote.

This is important even if we feel disconnected and disenfranchised. In the

Hebrew Bible (or Old Testament), the prophet Jeremiah received a message from God and wrote a letter. The letter was sent to his people who had been sent into Exile, forcibly rounded up and taken captive to Babylon, far away from their home. He wrote: 'seek the welfare of the city where I have sent you into exile, and pray to the LORD on its behalf, for in its welfare you will find your welfare.'(Jeremiah 29.7)

Even if we feel a bit like exiles in our country, a country that has perhaps changed beyond recognition, we are encouraged to seek its welfare.

This month, let us participate in the election and play our part. And once the 4th July has been and gone, let us continue to work and pray together for the welfare of this country. As Jesus taught his disciples to pray,

thy will be done, on earth as it is in heaven.

COULD RAYNE CHURCH BECOME AN 'ECO CHURCH'?

Volunteers have been working to gain an 'Eco Church' recognition for All Saints' Church in Rayne.

'Eco Church' is an accreditation run by *A Rocha; UK* equipping churches to care for God's creation through their worship, buildings, land, community engagement and individual lifestyles.

The ethos behind Eco Church is underpinned by the Church of England's goal to become Net Zero by 2030. (In simple terms, 'Net Zero' means, making no contribution to global warming. This is achieved by ensuring that the amount of fossil fuels (carbon) we put into the atmosphere is matched by the amount of carbon we take out of the atmosphere. Hence the term 'Carbon Neutral'.)

In the weeks to come our volunteers will be meeting to see what we can do as a church to meet the aspirational standards of the A Rocha organisation. We are hoping to attain their Bronze award in the first instance and then move on from there.

D Day Commemorations



It was wonderful to see over 90 people gathered at War Memorial on the morning of the 6th of June to commemorate the 80th anniversary of the D-Day landings.



Representatives of village organisations, British Legion, the church, and Rayne primary school took part in a solemn ceremony. Wreaths were laid on behalf of the Village, the British legion and school together with poems written and framed by ex-serviceman.



The village

crier deliv-

ered a message from the nations Pageant Master giving details of the landings and huge operation that followed which involved over 150,000 personnel from all the armed services many of those sadly and bravely losing their lives.

The pupils of Year 5 at Rayne primary school delivered a beautiful and poignant poem reflecting the bravery and those who lost their lives.

The ceremony was closed with a time of reflection and prayers from our church clergy Reverends Rachel and Roman.

The commemorations continued in the evening starting with the bell ringers 'Ring out for Peace' at 6.30 to join in with the national ring out and then at the Swan PH where over 150 of all ages gathered to join in a time of community singing led by the Braintree male

voice choir with the rendition of war time songs. This was followed by a Tribute which I had the honor to deliver prior to a period of perfect silence followed by the playing of last post and reveille. The evening closed with Prayers from Rev Nicki and the lighting of the Beacon by our District Councilor Ann Hooks.

Again it was wonderful to have with us members of the British legion including James Nelson RN who served on HMS Tyne during the landings.

A huge thank you must go to our Celebration Committee, led by Ian Reynolds, who again put together a well organised, professional and thought provoking day involving so many people. Thanks also to Cameron and the staff at the Swan for hosting the evening event.

The commemoration with involvement of so many of our villagers from such a wide spectrum of ages again demonstrates what a wonderful village we live in and how the community comes together in times of celebration, and remembrance. I thought it only proper to end with the Tribute delivered on the evening of the 6th.



Let us remember those who gave their lives at home and abroad during the D-Day landings, whose sacrifice enables us all to enjoy the peace and freedom we have today.

Let us remember those who came home wounded, physically and mentally, and the friends and family who cared for them.

Let us remember those who returned to restore their relationships and rebuild their working lives after years of conflict and turmoil.

Let us remember the families that lost husbands, wives, sons, daughters and sweethearts.

Let us remember the servicemen and women and merchant seafarers of all faiths and nationalities - from all countries - who fought, suffered and died during the D-Day landings and six years of war.

Let us all remember those in the Royal Navy, Army, Royal Air Force, Merchant Navy, and our Allies - the brave people who kept us safe on the home front and abroad and those in reserved occupations during the difficult time of war.

Let us remember the brave doctors and nurses who cared for the wounded, the men and women who toiled in the fields, the coal mines, the factories, the air raid wardens, police officers, firemen, ambulance drivers and the young people of the Scouts and Guides who all played such a vital role in the war.

Wildlife Reports, till June 2024



Tim Brown Symmons Close 13/5 sent a picture of *Robins in a nest* behind his house, they look very contented and are feathering well.

Roger Martin Duckend Green, heard the first cuckoo of the year at 7.30 am 9/06 by Pudneys Farm, north end of Shalford Road. Roger last heard one in Rayne 2 years ago and previously many years ago. Roger has had a Song Thrush singing in the garden most days for the last 3 months. Another long-

term singer has been a Black Cap which was not identified until Roger saw it in his Damson hedge.

Richard and Julia Harvey Shalford Road 15/5 reported 6-8 Fallow deer in the field behind their house. Judging by the deer tracks across several of the fields around Rayne there are

still a large number that only appear after dark. I have many times walked into a small area of scrub or woodland during daylight hours and found myself face to face with a deer lying on the ground watching me. If one makes no rapid movement or continuous eye contact one can continue without the deer moving position.

Richard and Julia also sent me a picture 17/3 of a *Grass Snake* on their Shalford Road allotments. In our garden they always lay eggs in our two-year-old compost heap especially if it is covered with an old carpet. This provides enough heat to hatch the eggs. Younger compost would be too hot. The allotments probably provide several suitable compost heaps, so long as they are not in plastic bins. The young are surprisingly long when they hatch.



Pauline Nunn 25/5 whose garden backs onto the Flitch Way sent me a picture of a *Jay* that has started visiting her garden, usually alone but sometimes has a mate. At this time of the year, they often visit gardens as they can provide sites



for food to feed to their own nestlings. Unfortunately, Jays are a major predator on other birds' nests taking both eggs and youngsters to feed their own young. Males and females are similar and often work together when robbing nests with one bird attracting the owner of the nest away while the other takes the eggs or youngsters from the nest. The most amazing list of reports was started by an email from Pat Hart 11/5 who reported

the patches of hedge along Pods Lane covered by caterpillars in a web. Pat thought these were caused by the Oak Processionary moth caterpillar. This moth has become widespread in parts of Europe and the hairs on the caterpillars cause severe irritation and respiratory symptoms to humans. It has also been found in the London area and some effort is being made to prevent it's spread. As we were about to leave for a few days break I visited Paul King to warn him of their presence before they caused havoc in his tree nurse-



they caused havoc in his tree nurseaware of their presence and told me they were the caterpillars of one of the small Ermine moths and they would not affect his nursery trees. In the following weeks I had numerous reports and pictures from other parishioners who had also seen signs of their presence along Pods Lane.

I understand that there are five species of Ermine moth and that they each prefer to eat certain plant species such as Box, Privet, Hawthorn and Apple. This is why it has only eaten parts of the hedge along Pods Lane where it has removed all the leaves of certain species. The caterpillars along Pods Lane are small about 20mm, though the White Ermine can grow to 40mm. The species in Pods Lane produced colonies numbering many thousands. While eating they produce enormous webs which must give them some protection while feeding and pupating. Most reports state that they do not cause lasting damage to the plants they are feeding on, as a gardener I find that difficult to believe. I admit that this is the first time I have seen sections of a hedge completely defoliated, and nongardeners may appreciate not having to cut certain hedges species this autumn.

I should like to thank **Pat Hart, Andrew Goodey, Stephen Taylor and Ann Hooks** for the excellent pictures they sent of the Ermine moths on Pods Lane hedge. I leave it to the editor to select from them for the Rayne in Focus. (*I believe this was one of Stephen Taylor's pictures but I could have provided my own from a Spindle berry bush that has been host to the Spindle Ermine moth for a few years. ED*)

Andrew Goodey The Street, identified the Pods Lane moth as probably the Spindle Ermine Moth. Andrew has installed 5 new Swift nesting boxes to 2 existing boxes and has currently four pairs of Swifts nesting on his house. This is an impressive success. Andrew also planted a Buckthorn bush in his garden which we evidently gave him. This year he has had a Brimstone butterfly laying eggs on its leaves. The original one in our garden has recently had a Brimstone flying round it, so I must check for eggs.

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
