Dear Friends,

November 2024

I wonder if last month you struggled to make a journey you needed to make? Braintree and the surrounding villages ground to a halt with Bakers Lane shut and various traffic lights around, including briefly on the main diversion route. Needless to say, it was a unifying time of shared frustration! Many people experienced incredibly long journey times with the main roads gridlocked, or having to take the Very Long Way Around just to get home. At times, it has felt a bit like whack-a-mole, because no sooner is one re-opened then another is closed! It has not been easy, but of course, for many people journeys are fraught with difficulties every day.

As I think about it, the first Christmas was a difficult journey. There was probably quite a bit of traffic; after all, there were a lot of people needing to go back to the town of their birth by decree of the Roman Empire. There was probably a fair bit of grumbling too; the occupying Roman Empire was hardly popular, and the reason for the journey was to pay them a new tax! This was hardly joyous! Wildlife Reports, till November 2024

Phil Monk, Smithsfield 27/8 was pond dipping with their 3 grandsons when they netted a Great Crested Newt. Phil commented that it was the first one that he or the grandsons had ever seen. I agree that this species is spectacular, but it used to be very widespread in the parish. Many garden and field ponds contained them when I was a youngster. That was some time ago as I am now in my eighties. Our own garden pond and most ponds in the village had good populations and gardening in our garden always uncovered newts, but Syl and I cannot remember



when we recently last saw one. I hope Phil's newt

finds a mate and rears some offspring as Phil's record is the only one I have known for some time.

Stephen Taylor when clearing his Shalford Road allotment found a very large toad. This is another amphibian that has declined in the Parish. They breed in water but were often regularly seen in the Parish. Toads should be

welcomed back as they eat slugs, spiders, worms, aphids and ants and large Toads have been recorded as eating mice.

Tim Wignall Pound Farm Cottage 31/10 reported sightings of a Great Spotted Woodpecker in his garden. We are near neighbours of Tim and we often see a female feeding on our bird feeders. This is a good sign as the peckers have probably found a suitable nesting hole locally and hopefully will be able to retain it until nesting time in the spring. Tim has had a Wren and Coal Tit visiting and on 19/10 a Fox walked past his cottage. On 27/10 a Polecat was running down the ditch near his cottage, I am envious as I have never seen a wild Polecat.

Vicky Pallatt sent me a nice picture of a butterfly which I am unable to identify. Normally I do not report these sightings but as reports are short for this month the editor has agreed to publish the picture to give readers the opportunity to try and identify it.

At **Goulds** one of our sons Francis visited and was woken by a Little Owl calling from very near his bedroom window. The Owl then continued calling for a long period of time preventing him from sleeping.

The pond in our garden is in a poor state as the water appears to be very polluted. This is probably due to the large number of Mallard ducks visiting it. I stopped feeding them at least three months ago but they continue to visit at night. A visitor counted 24 ducks on our pond recently so the volume of excrement is very large. This year we only recorded one dragonfly visit because of the water conditions. Before the Mallard occupied the pond, we had double figure numbers of species of Dragonflies and Damselflys breeding each season. This is entirely my fault as I could not resist feeding the day-old ducklings when they hatched. When these grew up, they remembered that Goulds was an ideal place to nest and hatch their offspring. Mallard ducks are very intelligent birds. One of our grandchildren has an incubator and I gave her some duck eggs to hatch. She hatched all three eggs the first year and they followed her about the garden. She finally released them at a well-known site where ducks are fed. They still recognise her after all this time and when visitors arrive and want to take pictures they pose for a picture unlike the other Mallards on the site.

Traffic signs, warning motorists of duck on Shalford Road have appeared at either end of Duckend Green. I am not responsible for these warning signs. Being a human, I would much preferred Highways to have filled in the potholes along the verges of Shalford road one of which measures a depth of 15ins. Perhaps Highways is expecting each pothole will be used by a pair of Mallard next year, hence the signs.

Badgers have created their own path through our garden. They enter the garden under the netting despite there being proper Badger gates round the perimeter fence. Badgers usually use a self-built latrine for their droppings, but our badgers have taken over an old rabbit hole and filled it with their droppings.

These latrines give a good indi-

cation of what the badgers have been eating. Their favourite diet is one of juicy earthworms which produces a very wet dropping. Other droppings contain feather and fur and rarely some bones which indicates they have been scavenging other remains they have found.

District Councillor Ann Hooks

Firstly, I send best wishes to all residents during the upcoming Festive period. May you all have a healthy, <u>prosperous</u> and merry time, during this month!

Braintree District Council held its Full Council meeting early in November. At the meeting I spoke on a motion put forward about the expansion of Stansted Airport. Funding has been

granted to raise passenger numbers through the airport, without increase of flight activity. The expansion is a polarising issue. Even though it is not in our District, but with Rayne being the closest Parish, I felt the need to speak in the debate.

The airports expansion does bring some positives like the new college, providing training and skills for people and there is obviously the economic factor with the provision of an extra 5000 jobs. In the motion, BDC will commit to promote the working and training opportunities at the airport.

There are of course negatives. One of which is <u>aircraft</u> flying over the village, which I know causes much angst for some residents. BDC will commit to be an active participant in any consultations with NATS on the future of flight movements.

With many of Rayne residents working at the airport or attending the college, BDC will also commit to work with Essex County Council and other travel operators to ensure that we have the best public transport. I stated during the debate that it needs improvement. One bus an hour from our major town to a major transport hub and employment area is not good enough.

I welcomed and supported BDCs active involvement in the items mentioned, to support, protect and help our residents.

I also attended the latest Local Plan Subcommittee meeting. There are still no dates for when the Call for Sites will be discussed.

A new consultation has gone live as part of the review process and this one is on the Design Code of the District. It can be found at

https://www.braintree.gov.uk/planning-building-control/design-code/1

Closing date is 16th December, for anyone wishing to state their views on how new developments should be look like.

Twelve tips for Christmas...and after

With Christmas rapidly approaching here are a few seasonal tips to help keep you safe at home, shopping, visiting, and after Christmas too:

- If you need to store Christmas food and drink, presents and other goodies within garages and outbuildings, ensure what you are storing is out of sight and that the building is securely locked with good quality well fitted locks. <u>Treat your shed to a shed</u> <u>alarm</u>.
- 2. Avoid tempting window shopping burglars; don't leave presents and valuables on full view in front of a window. Having parcels delivered, and may be out, make sure that you make suitable secure delivery arrangements to reduce the risk of theft.
- 3. Whenever leaving the house always ensure that your windows and doors are closed and locked. Don't attract burglars to your home by leaving it in darkness; leave lights on timers, perhaps treat yourself to a TV simulator too.
- 4. Lock gates to keep unwanted visitors from getting to the rear of your home.
- 5. When you go to leave the house and find that your car is all iced up, don't leave it unattended with the engine running to de-ice it. It only takes a second to steal your car and it would invalidate any insurance claim.
- Park safely; look for a 'Park Mark' accredited car park <u>www.parkmark.co.uk/car-park-finder</u> Check that your car is locked before you leave it and don't leave valuables and gifts on display in your car.
- 7. Whether an evening out or Christmas shopping keep your bags, handbags, wallets and mobile safe. Busy places make it easier for the sneak thief, so be alert at all times.
- A Christmas get together make sure that you have considered how you are getting home in advance and avoid using unlicensed taxis. Ensure you drink responsibly, and are aware of your surroundings, whilst keeping your drink and belongings safe. www.suzylamplugh.org/Pages/FAQs/Category/personal-safety
- 9. When out celebrating don't leave mobile phones on tables in full view, don't leave handbags on the back of chairs.
- 10. Watch what you put on social media; check your settings to ensure that you are not broadcasting when you are not at home and the lovely gifts you may have received.
- 11. After Christmas don't advertise your nice gifts to the thieves by putting the empty boxes out for collection, disguise them, fold them up inside out or put them inside another non-descript box.
- 12. Record your new property free on <u>www.immobilise.com</u>, install tracking and security apps on relevant electrical and computer products. Consider a property marking product.


